Class 9: ROOTS, FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

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Class Rules

- New exhibitors should write "new exhibitor" on hidden portion of tickets.
- Proper number of roots and vegetables must be exhibited.
- Specimens should be free of blemishes and well-shaped.
- Multiple specimen exhibits should be of uniform size, shape and colour.
- Clean, but do not scrub, exhibit items.
- For onions, remove jagged and dirty scales but do not peel.
- Trim tops of beets and carrots 1/2" above crown; trim roots to 1".
- Sections with only one entry will not be counted for section 41. -In the
 event of a tie for Section 41, the new exhibitor with the most first
 place entries in section 1- 40 will win the prize

- 1. Potatoes, 4 White
- 2. Potatoes, 4 Red
- 3. Potatoes, 10 Fingerlings
- 4. Potatoes in a box. Fill a box with any varieties of potatoes you have grown this year. The more varieties the better, Display to count.
- 5. Carrots, 4 short approximately 4 inches
- 6. Carrots, 4 long approximately 7 inches
- 7. Carrots rainbow
- 8. Basket of beets. Can use red, golden, oblong, or whatever kind you have grown. The more varieties the better. **Display** to count.
- 9. Tomatoes, 10 Cherrie
- 10. Tomatoes, 6 green with stems
- 11. Tomatoes, 6 red with stems

- 12. Tomatoes, 2 Heritages. On a recipe card tell us about the tomato's history.
- 13. A variety of tomatoes, all colors and sizes that you have grown. Be creative with your display.
- 14. Squash, 3 varieties from your plot. LEAVE the stems on.
- 15. Pumpkins, 2 pie variety, stems on
- 16. Pumpkins, 2 field variety, stems on
- 17. Pumpkins, 1 white or warty or Cinderella variety
- 18. Onions, 4 Spanish
- 19. Onions, 6 dutch sets yellow or white
- 20. From the onion patch. Grab a pail and fill it with onions red, yellow, white spanish, multipliers, more varieties the better. Display to count.
- 21. Corn 4 ears, table, yellow
- 22. Corn 4 ears, bi colored
- 25. Bowl of beans. Make an attractive display of colored beans. Can use any variety you have grown. (example green, yellow, purple, pole) the more varieties the better. Display to count.
- 26. Cucumbers, 6 pickling 3-5 inches long.
- 27. Cucumbers, 6 table 5 9 inches long.
- 28. Spice up your display. In a vase use red, green, yellow, hot or sweet peppers to create an interesting centre piece for the table. The more varieties the better. Display to count.
- 29. Leeks 3 stalks, tops trimmed, and roots cut to 1 inch.
- 30. A braid of garlic or onions
- 31. Turnip 2
- 32. **Special -** Strangely shaped vegetable 1st \$6.00 and 2nd \$4.00, no third prize, donated by **Helen Harrison**
- 33. **Special** Gourds in a bowl or basket, at least 3 varieties 2 of each. 1st prize \$10.00 donated by **Cathy Brown**
